From the Principal

s we head towards the end of the year, we start to take the time to reflect Aon the year we've had, and what a year 2020 has been so far! Despite the challenges of COVID-19, students and staff have continued to further improve their skills, and as a school we have made many improvements.

Our new building works have commenced and our transition and advanced students had a wonderful time on our first day trip to Woodhouse, despite missing out

on an overnight field trip. We were able to celebrate SSO week, Wear It Purple Day and

the International Day of Peace, as well as student achievements in our first whole school assembly for

the year. We also celebrated the successes of our graduating students.

Our outstanding work through the Trauma Aware Schools Initiative was recognised by the Department for Education, and although we were unable to showcase our achievements as part of a "face to face" conference, we were

invited to share our journey with a film crew. The film was recently launched and has been made available to all schools. A major focus of this work has been on improving teacher practice and introducing our own version of

self-regulation scales, which can be used in classes by students to identify how they are feeling and when they need some support. Feedback provided by students and staff to one of our professional learning teams will help us to refine the scales and embed them into the curriculum.

With improvement in reading and writing being our 2 main site improvement goals this year, we have continued the focus on oral language and the development of a suitable phonics program, which will be implemented from 2021. Staff feedback and student progress indicates we are well on track to achieve our improvement goals for 2020, and early in

term 4, staff will be considering how to refine our improvement goals and challenges of practice for 2021. Your feedback via the parent survey is also valuable in helping us to refine our improvement goals.

This term, teachers have engaged in a range of professional development, including EALD methodologies, phonics training, Trauma Informed Practice and the Learning English: Achievement and Proficiency (LEAP) levels training. Staff and students also practiced an emergency invacuation and evacuation drill earlier in the term.

Teachers have been working intensively on the development of our term 4 post transition course which will be implemented for the first time next term. This program has been developed to ensure we better prepare our students for success in mainstream schools, as the length of our Intensive English program has been extended and in future all students will transition at the end of a semester (namely end of terms 2 & 4) rather than mid semester.



We look forward to implementing this new program next term, and as a school will continue to work towards achieving our improvement goals for 2020.


#### Beacon "Polish"
