Principal's Report



Perm 4 is a very busy time of year as the school **L** prepares itself for the new year and all the changes which it will bring. During this term, the students have been engaging with the community through a range of activities. The streets surrounding the school are considerably brighter thanks to the

student's collaboration with the West Croydon Paint Bank. Students have worked with Ma Whiting from Octopus for a Preemie South Australia to produce crocheted "flat Jelly Fish" which calm and comfort premature babies across Australia. Across the year, students have worked with volunteers from the Origin Foundation to construct solar lights and robotic hands to be sent overseas to communities and individuals of need. Within the school community, students have worked to build walkways and beautify doors with striking and meaningful artwork.

The Dulwich Centre has launched a video which was made in collaboration with past students. The video welcomes non-English speaking new arrivals to Adelaide and talks about the difficulties they will face and how they can be overcome. The video is a moving reminder of the important role the school plays in supporting students and families to successfully transition through a time of significant change and disruption.

Change in the school's physical environment is also coming in 2020. The school's much anticipated building project has been scheduled to commence construction in August of 2020 and the work will continue until August 2021. The new building will provide 8 modern classrooms, an Artroom, a new Student Services and a flexible space for use by the classes. On completion of the building in late 2021, all transportable buildings constructed prior to 1990 will be demolished and the areas remediated. In 2021, a new grounds shed will also be constructed over the current location of the Art room.
