# From the Principal

With the year almost over, it's time for us to reflect on all that we've achieved despite the ongoing challenges of COVID-19. We have managed to maintain our focus on our goals of improving reading, writing and oral language

skills, and celebrated the many successes of students and staff throughout the year.

Fortunately, we managed to hold our whole school assemblies in the gym, including our term 4 assembly celebrating cultural diversity. We had *Anthony Wilson* speak to students about the importance of language and culture as an Aboriginal young man and we acknowledged our rich and highly diverse school population where at least 25 different first languages are spoken. The most frequent languages spoken are Dari and Hazaraghi, Swahili, Vietnamese, Arabic and Thai. Other languages include: Mandarin,



Spanish, Kirundi, Nepali, Japanese, Pitjantajara, Korean and Bosnian.

As a school, we know how important it is for all of our students to develop intercultural understandings by learning to value their own cultures, languages and beliefs, as well as those of others. All of our students have opportunities to make connections with people from a range of cultures and develop an appreciation for the things we have in common, as well as differences, enabling a mutual respect, empathy, and curiosity.

Although we are yet to receive our final External School Review (ESR) report, we know that the panel comments will highlight much of the work we do as a school to create a positive, safe learning environment for our students. The ESR team commented on the calmness in classrooms and surroundings, and on the classroom environments, which reflected an acceptance of the cultural diversity of students. They also commented positively on the commitment and support for the improvement work outlined in the School Improvement Plan (SIP) by staff, and it was clear to the ESR team that staff are passionate about improving learning outcomes for all learners.

We had our new building handed over at the start of this term, just before the ESR and we are currently using 7 out of 8 classrooms, as well as the Art room. Our Student Services

team are located in the building, along with 8 teachers, all of whom are thoroughly enjoying their new space.

We are still in the process of purchasing furniture and have set



up a temporary "library corner" which is open at recess for student use. A new grounds shed and landscaping are the final stages of the building project, along with an outdoor gardening learning space, all of which are due to be completed before the end of 2021.

Last week, we had 27 year 6s and 7s attend a transition day, and we look forward to welcoming them to the school in 2022. We also had 10 former students meet with our transition classes to share their experiences and help prepare them for high school.

This week, we farewell approximately 100 of our current students as they transition to mainstream high schools across the metropolitan area. With the reduction in student numbers due to COVID-19, we will also be farewelling a few staff members. *Bronwen McClelland*, our Student Services and Community Engagement Senior Leader has won a position at Parafield Gardens High School and we wish her all the best in her new role. *Betty Bielecki*, our Transition and International Students Coordinator is also leaving us at the end of this year, along with *Elia Angel* who has taught at the school for the past 20 years, *Tom Missikos* who has taught at the school for 15 years and *Amin Afzali* one of our Bilingual School Services Officer who has been at the school for 12 years. We are sad to see them go and must thank them for their many contributions to the school.

On behalf of all staff, we wish our families a safe Christmas holiday break and a prosperous new year.

Teacher Ms Betty Bieleki has regularly made a generous donation of additional supplies of eggs and milo to supplement this too.
